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Early Years 1773-1850

1773

Thomas Innocent registered his house as Dissenting Meeting House

1794

Cropwell Butler Methodist Society, with 12 members, became part of newly formed Newark Circuit

Late 18th or early 19th Century

Chapel erected on land leased from Ann Parr of Radcliffe


Original building now forms part of Schoolroom

1813-14 Weekly Sunday service at 10am

1825 & 1831

Purchase of leased and additional land from Ann Parr

Part of Village Life 1851-1900

1851

- Attendance on the Sunday of the Religious Census: 75 at the morning service & 90 at the evening service
- 1st surviving register of Sunday School:
 79 children comprising 46.7% of 4 13
 year olds in Cropwell Butler

1839-1852: Competition for Wesleyans from the Primitive Methodists

- Primitive Methodist Society established in Cropwell Butler
- > Opening of Primitive Methodist Chapel
- Primitive Methodist Sunday School started

1852

Nottingham Guardian

"Teachers of Wesleyan & Primitive Methodist Sunday Schools at Cropwell Butler, gave their scholars the usual treat of plum cake and tea upon Christmas Day in their respective chapels" **1858** Sunday School scholars received a Bible after substantial attendance

1859 Alterations to Chapel at cost of £178 3s 10d

1850-75

Occupations of leading Methodists: 1 farmer; 4 agricultural labourers; 2 blacksmiths; 2 tailors; 2 carpenters; 1 groom; 1 lace worker



Matthew Cooper was an agricultural labourer and a leader in the Sunday School. He and his family emigrated to Canada about 1860

1900 Sunday School registered 38 children: 24 boys & 14 girls

New Chapel for 20th Century 1901-1945

1903

- Building of New Wesleyan Chapel begun
 See the Foundation Stone inscribed
 "Wesleyan 1903" above the window over the front entrance
- Cost just over £900 including fittings & heating
- People from Cropwell Butler and surrounding area purchased stones and bricks

 Chapel was built in front of existing structure and connected by sliding door (still in use)


- New Chapel opened on Easter Monday, 4th April. Marquee, hired from Mr Metcalf of Nottingham for £2 15s, erected opposite the Chapel. Public tea, at 9d per person
- 38 people paid pew rent of 7d/quarter
 See numbers 1-23 on the ends of pews

Renowned evangelist Gipsy Smith

visited the Chapel; 1500 people attended using a marquee in an adjacent field.

 Practical Christianity was the keynote of his address

Extract from local newspaper 22nd June 1905



"They can do anything at Cropwell Butler." The flattering observation was made by a Bingham lady, well acquainted with the movements of the Nonconformist bodies in the neighbourhood, and referred to the leaders of Wesleyanism in the pretty but somewhat wandering village to the south-east of Nottingham. It was a complimentary criticism, but the results of the labours of this progressive band of Methodists more than justify the statement. The oldest church in the Bingham circuit, it has done splendid work; there is a large Sunday school in connection with it, and even a greater Band of Hope membership, which during the past three or four years has grown remarkably.

The village, unfortunately, like many others, is suffering from the rural emigration; but, this notwithstanding, the congregation continues to increase. A little over a year ago a new place of worship was erected at a cost approaching a thousand pounds. This was a momentous undertaking in a little community of only four hundred and fifty inhabitants, but possibly the most memorable event in the history of the church took place yesterday when there was seen the culmination of the efforts to clear off the debt of about £400 remaining upon the chapel. Chiefly owing to the exertions of Messrs. Newton, Crompton, and Walker, the family of each of whom have been prominent Wesleyans for many years, the wall-known Free Church missioner Gipsy Smith visited the village and conducted a service there during the afternoon. The evangelist received a welcome which must have been intensely gratifying, for there were assembled to hear him in a huge marquee quite fifteen hundred people.

1932

Electricity came to Cropwell Butler and oil lamps removed from the Chapel

1934

Primitive Methodist Chapel closed following reunification of branches of Methodism in 1932

1945 Mains water connected

1960

- Exterior painting of church, cloakroom and buildings by Mr L.B. Taylor for £76
- Electric lighting alterations by Lenton & Wilkinson at cost of £65 5s 8d

1961

- Mrs Ida Holroyd donated 2 chairs in memory of her husband
 See the Chairs by the Communion Table at the front
- Small refreshment counter erected to be used by newly formed Youth Club

1962

6 infra-red overhead heaters installed in Schoolroom by Lenton & Wilkinson for £72

- Ground at back of Chapel improved by Denis Barratt and Frank Branston
- Wooden cross on wall behind pulpit made and donated by Roy Barratt
 See the Cross on the north wall

1**964**

- Tubular under pew heating installed by Lenton & Wilkinson for £261 7s 5d
- First Candlelit Service on Christmas Eve in the Chapel, jointly with the Anglicans

- Funds of the Chapel Trust and Society merged
- Joint Anglican & Methodist outing to visit Coventry Cathedral
- Repairs to roof

 See Communion Table at the front
- New Hymn Books and covers bought for £10
- Outside light installed at back of Schoolroom
- Kitchen modernised

1972

Donation of a New English Bible Old Testament by Miss Clara Frankton and Miss Gladys Frankton, in memory of Miss Doris Scott

 Sponsored 12 hour organ playing marathon by Roy Barratt raised £282 and led to the start of the monthly Sunday evening Fellowship



- Interior redecorated
- 1974 Outside painting at £150

- Church Council replaced Board of Trustees
- Chapel of Ease closed and united services began in the Methodist Chapel

1979

75th Birthday Celebrations of opening of Chapel Building; Service of Thanksgiving, exhibition of 'All Our Yesterdays' & performance of 'Oliver' by children of the village

1980

Extensions to Schoolroom of new cloakroom, toilet and storeroom; all done with voluntary work by Chapel members

1982

Dedication of items brought from the Chapel of Ease: Font, Chairs, Brass

1986



- Wooden lectern donated and dedicated in memory of Tom Simpson

- Family Services increased to twice a month and planned around a theme each quarter
- > Chapel redecorated inside and out
- Millennium Banners made

2002

New outside Notice Board erected

- Celebrations for Centenary of opening of New Chapel building
- New Grantham and Vale of Belvoir Methodist Circuit formed

- Little Saints baby & toddler group started jointly with Cropwell Bishop Chapel and Anglicans (held at Cropwell Bishop)
- Plaque donated and dedicated as memorial to Denis and Bessie Barratt. Denis was a steward for many years and Bessie the organist

All 6 main side windows replaced at cost of £7140. £5000 met by grant from Samworth bequest to village

- Pulpit removed with front remaining as feature on north wall

2019

- > New carpeting laid at front of Chapel
- Balcony in schoolroom removed and new lighting installed

- Chapel closed because of Covid-19 pandemic and national lockdown
- Collections continued to be organised for Foodbank
- Church Council meetings & monthly Fellowship held via Zoom
- Nativity service held via Zoom and villagers put Nativity displays in windows

- > Chapel reopened for worship in June
- Tableau of Nativity Scene visited by over 30 people during Christmas Eve. No service because of continued Covid infection risk
